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		Fire and Treason <i>How have significant national events become significant for us locally?</i> Children will learn about the Great Fire of London and the impact locally: fire safety in our school and our community. Children will also learn about the significance of Guy Fawkes.		Changes in Toys <i>How have toys changed over time?</i> Children will investigate changes in toys over time, using a range of sources and local artefacts to compare and contrast toys during different eras, including playground games and the use of electronics, including trains.		Trains and Transport <i>How significant is rail transport to Northallerton and how has it changed over time?</i> Children will build upon previous learning about machines to investigate the importance of railway to Northallerton and its significance to local people and daily life. They will identify similarities and differences between ways of life in different periods.	
		Ancient Civilizations <i>What are the achievements of some of the world's earliest civilizations?</i> This project teaches children about the history of three of the world's first ancient civilizations: ancient Sumer, the Shang Dynasty and the Indus Valley and an in-depth study of Ancient Egypt.		Invasion 1 <i>Who were the Anglo-Saxons and Scots and why did they settle in Britain?</i> <i>How is the Anglo-Saxon and Viking settlement reflected in our local area?</i> Children will build on previous learning and note connections between national and local events. They will learn about change and cause in this time period and how it affected the way of life locally.
